A Family's Future and A Family Goat

Mrs. Sanders told this story to her junior high class:

"Thirty years ago, during Advent, my religion teacher told us that she had just received a letter from the leader of an organization that worked with the poor around the world. "In the letter, the family told us all about themselves, and thanked us for the gift of the goat. They said that it had changed their lives. One of their children was soon going to be able to start school. They didn't spend their dayshungry anymore. They were able to sell the milk, too.

"Our teacher passed around the letter and the photograph. She told us to take as much time as we wanted reading it and looking at the picture of the family. She didn't have to tell us that there was a special connection now between us and them. We felt it.
